Amidst a host of citywide events, our focus was on two captivating exhibitions: "A Sense of Place," complementing the renowned A History of Portsmouth NH in 101 Objects publication, and "Reinventing Portsmouth," which delved into the city's arts, culture, and historic preservation, juxtaposed against the challenging backdrop of urban renewal in the 1970s. 





### VISITATION

### MARKETING AND OUTREACH

The year 2023 was the first time that Portsmouth Historical Society had a full-time Marketing Manager on staff to oversee all print and digital marketing. Consistency across platforms and a more intentional, data-driven approach characterized our strategy across all platforms. Last year, Google Analytics was added to our website for the first time, tracking user traffic and behavior for the year. Analytics has influenced our strategies to increase visitor traffic through Search Engine Optimization, identifying new keywords to incorporate on our website, such as "iconic Portsmouth places."

The organization has also increased its visibility by developing connections with other local businesses. An in-kind partnership with Seacoast Lately, a regional events social account, increased our visibility on social platforms with a demographic between ages 25–45.

A long-lasting project for 2023 was updating the decade-old welcome video. Along with Atlantic Media, new interviews and images were selected to tell a more inclusive history of Portsmouth. We hope that this 15-minute-long film will orient visitors for years to come.





Our Gingerbread Exhibition was included in a PBS special, airing on 137 PBS stations nationally, with a potential reach of 150 million viewers.

### **COLLECTIONS**

This year the Collections and Exhibitions team have moved the permanent collection to an online, cloud-based database called CatalogIt. Previously, the collection was housed on Past Perfect, which was only accessible on one computer. CatalogIt not only has desktop access, but a mobile app as well. Now, information can be updated at the drop of a hat! With the help of volunteers Lynne Costa, Brenda Brewster, and Diane Fagan Affleck, the records have been cleaned up and new information added. The next step is preparing for an online hub for visitors to view through our website.



#### **Adopt an Artifact**

This program was started in 2023 to bring attention to the critical work that our conservators do in order to preserve historical artifacts for future generations. We have approximately 3,000 objects in our collection, and much like any antiques, they

require a little TLC. Artifacts often need specialized care or housing to keep them in stable condition. While all objects have their eventual lifespan; things such as damage, poor storage, and exposure can shorten that time.

In 2023 our Curator and Collections Manager got together with members and an expert in the field to showcase several artifacts and bring attention to their condition and needs. This members-exclusive event touched on why we save what we save, and what kind of detailed work is involved in caring for the physical artifacts that make up the story of Portsmouth.

Upstairs, "Reinventing Portsmouth, Renewal to Renaissance: 1970s" garnered so much interest and praise from local residents that we are currently pursuing a publication with Bob Thoresen to more fully explore the topics covered in the galleries.

In the fall, we hosted fan favorites the Pastel Society of NH and the Abstract Four-Barbara Adams, Tom Glover, Peter Cady, and Dustan Knight—in our Balcony Gallery. We also installed a small, semi-permanent exhibition in our Program Room of objects, paintings, and prints in our collection to ensure that our treasures are always on view at 10 Middle Street.

"Captain, Celebrity, & Cliché" continued to be on view at the John Paul Jones House and continued to delight visitors with the lore and myth of Captain John Paul Jones himself.

#### **AllThings Merry and Bright**


In 2023, we celebrated our 33rd Annual Gingerbread House Contest and Exhibition with the theme, "Portsmouth Past, Present, and Future." Participants rose to the challenge and gave us everything from futuristic rock shows in Prescott Park to iconic Portsmouth tugboats, tall ships, and submarines! We never fail to be impressed by the creativity, ingenuity, and engineering prowess of these gingerbread architects. Gelatin sheet windows, bubble gum siding, rock candy pavement, peppermint shingles – visitors always leave abuzz with new ideas for the next contest! For the first time this year, we also hosted an in-house gingerbread house workshop, an ugly sweater cookie swap to celebrate the season (and bring even more sugar into the building, of course), and a smash to round out the season. ### EDUCATION AND PROGRAMS

#### Education

The Portsmouth Historical Society continues to provide Portsmouth's 3rd-grade students with a yearlong local history program. Monthly classroom visits, artifact investigations, and the much anticipated downtown Portsmouth walking tour field trip are part of our free educational program. Schools included New Franklin, Little Harbour, and Dondero Elementary. School walking tour sites included John Paul Jones House, Moffatt-Ladd House, Moffatt-Ladd Warehouse, Portsmouth Athenaeum, and African Burying Ground.

#### Programs

This year witnessed tremendous growth for programs at the Historical Society. Our aim has been not only to bring in more visitors, but to diversify the types of programming we run in the hopes of reaching new, first-time audiences. History can get a bad rap as something stuffy and staid; we wanted to recontextualize how our visitors interact with the subject by presenting exciting hands-on activities, workshops, partnership programs with unique organizations, and events for the whole family.



#### **Family Days**

Held monthly on Saturdays, these events center around a theme, such as gardening, mending, ocean conservation, or experimental art and include hands-on activities for kids of all ages.



### **Knit Happens**

Held monthly on Friday afternoons, is yarn social circle fosters conversations between community members and allows us to bring out unique fiber pieces from our collection to show and inspire the group.



### **Read it and Eat!**

A potluck series that very literally brings people to the table (in our galleries!) to build community around recipes from local cookbooks.

#### **Portsmouth On Tap**

Connecting to new audiences by hosting history-themed trivia (paired with history-themed beer of course!) at five Portsmouthbased breweries.





In addition to these new series, we hosted many other workshops, lectures, community discussions, and curator tours. Some highlights include our Brewster Series bark-basket workshop with indigenous artist Jennifer Lee, a wonderful community conversation on the 1970s Portsmouth art scene with Marguerite Mathews, Jon Kimbell, and Bob Thoresen, and the return of our popular Curator Tours that provide visitors with an in-depth look at our exhibitions. Beyond our on-site work, we also began hosting more events in the community including a presentation and round of history trivia at the Portsmouth Senior Center.

#### Hands-on Workshops

Bringing history and craft together through several one-off workshops, we were able to work with a diverse group of New England artists who guided attendees in creating their own one-of-a-kind projects to take home.



#### Humanities to Go

New Hampshire Humanities' statewide speakers' bureau allowed us to host historians, specialists, professors, and musicians for lectures, workshops, and performances that were free to the public.







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

### THE YEAR IN REVIEW

Thanks to a grant from the 1772 Foundation, we were able to start work on the facade of the Morton-Benedict House. We were able to repair rotted window sills, preserve wooden columns at the entrance to the building, and complete a wash of the bricks to help improve its appearance. Additional grant funding has been secured for 2024 to complete the exterior work to include painting and masonry repairs.

### RECENT ACCQUISITION

Founded in 1980 by Randon Eddy and Mercie Chick, the Iris Women's Club was located at 40 Pleasant Street in Portsmouth. As Eddy recalled: "It was always billed as a Women's Club. A safe place for women to visit and leave any harassment or stress from the outside, sometime unforgiving world, behind." The iris flower gets its name from the Greek messenger goddess of the rainbow. The rainbow has been a prominent image within the LGBTQ+ community since 1978, when the first rainbow pride flag, designed by Gilbert Baker, was introduced at the San Francisco Gay Freedom Day Parade. The private Iris club may have been the first organized lesbian club in the Seacoast and the only private lesbian club in New England at the time. It had some six hundred members when it closed in 1987.

Given by Tom Kaufhold, head of the Seacoast NH LGBTQ History Project, the Iris sign represents an initiative by the Historical Society to collect objects that are representative of the history of the Seacoast's communities as a whole and in all their diversity.

### DEVELOPMENT

In 2023, new Development Manager Kim Simmons hit the ground running. Since starting in January, she has dedicated herself to increasing Portsmouth Historical Society's outreach, fundraising, and capacity to complete large projects. We restructured admissions to give discounts to local residents and joined Museums for All, a program which allows us to provide free tickets to people on SNAP/EBT. With the ability to follow up more consistently with members, we were able to grow our membership from 359 people at the end of 2022, to 461 members at the end of 2023.

Grants received this year covered more than just exhibition costs; we were awarded funds that allowed us to see to much-needed deferred maintenance. A grant seminar mid-July helped us focus our requests, and with those new tools in mind we were honored to receive a \$20,000 unrestricted operating grant from New Hampshire Charitable Foundation, as well as a \$7,500 grant to improve the storage and housing of our 3,000 object collection. In addition to adding a new program to support the conservation of our historical objects, Adopt an Artifact, Portsmouth Historical Society collaborated with local partners to put on a murder mystery event at the Music Hall Lounge in September.

We look forward to a fun and engaging year in this seaside community we call home. History is our passion and we are happy to share that passion with everyone who visits us here in the heart of Portsmouth. Thank you for being a part of our important mission to tell Portsmouth stories.


